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COMMANDANT'S COMMENTS

OA JOURNEY TO REMEMBER
n July 15th nine Marines from the Tar Heel Detachment joined by four Marines from the Detachment in Oriental met at the main gate at Camp Lejeune to begin a journey that would bring lasting memories of the great strides that our Marine Corps is making to provide the facilities and treatments for our wounded, both physically and mentally, Marines. We were met at the main gate by Command Advisor Craig Stephens of the Wounded Warrior Battalion Camp Lejeune and headed for chow at the Officers and NCO Club on base where we feasted on a buffet lunch that filled the pits of our stomachs. While there an announcement was made that guests were in house including a World War II veteran, ninety-three year old Frank Mansfield of the Tar Heel Detachment Marine Corps League from Raleigh. This brought many well wishers to his table to thank him for his service including officers and enlisted. After lunch we then proceeded to the main objective of the day, the touring of the facilities of Wounded Warrior Battalion East. The first introduction was our posing for a picture in front of a statue of Marines Helping marines. A symbol of what this program is all about. The Wounded Warrior Battalion East is comprised of seven detachments in addition to the battalion's headquarters and barracks at Camp Lejeune. The focus of effort for WWB-E is taking care of wounded, ill and injured Marines and their families as they proceed through the Integrated Disability Evaluation system process. With a full time staff of more than 200 Marines, Sailors and civilian professionals, they are dedicated to ensuring care of our Wounded Warriors throughout the recovery and transition process.

The battalion is currently under the command of Lt Col Leland Suttee, USMC. In a question and answer session with Lt Col Suttee it was asked how the Marine Corps came about starting this program. He responded that during the time that Marine Corps Commandant General James Amos was Commandant at Camp Lejeune the idea was proposed for such a unit. His response was, "Then just do it." "Etiam in Pugna" or still in the fight is an essential conviction which the Marine Corps instills in each of its wounded, ill and injured Marines. These WI & I Marines are focused

on their abilities and are highly motivated to continue to contribute to the Marine Corps war fighting mission. The approach to care ensures that recovering Marines return to their units as quickly as their medical conditions will allow. Allowing WI & I Marines to stay in the fight is what makes the Marine Corps care model unique and successful.

The care is designed to provide ongoing services and support that is not normally resident in an operational unit. WWB-E assists WI & I Marines and their families with their needs through all phases of care from recovery to rehabilitation to community reintegration. There is no "one size fits all" approach to care, so the battalion has a cross section of services and resources to ensure WI & I Marines and families are provided for. Along with the facilities to provide the physical aspects of rehabilitation, including swimming pools, weight lifting, basket ball courts for wheelchair bound Marines and facilities for the mental aspects of recovery. The program also has VA liaisons to help facilitate the move from active duty ser-



vices to attending the medical needs after discharge. The Sergeant Merlin German Wounded Warrior Call Center is set up with staff to provide 24/7 assistance to active duty, reserve and veteran wounded, ill and injured Marines and their families. The call center staff conducts scheduled outreach calls to WI & I Marines and also receive calls from Marines and families/caregivers requesting support. After a day of enlightenment of seeing in place what our Marine Corps is doing for our "Marines Helping Marines" these members of the Tar Heel Detachment: Toby Roberts, Robert Frederico, Juan Munoz, Harry Schweitzer, John Staley, Frank Mansfield, Terry Smith, Steve Curlee and John Dilday left with a proud feeling of how the Marine Corps is setting the example of once again taking care of its own.

Chaplain's Corner Jim Niver

The Chief of Chaplains of the United States Navy advises the Commandant of the Marine Corps, the Chief of Naval Operations, and the Commandant of the Coast Guard "on all matters pertaining to religion within the Navy, United States Marine Corps, and United States Coast Guard" -- but the Deputy Chief of Chaplains serves as Chaplain of the Marine Corps, "advising the CMC on religious ministry matters in reference to support, personnel, plans, programs, policies, and facilities within the USMC." Additionally, in the concurrent role of Navy Deputy Chief of Chaplains, the person holding this position is "Deputy Director of Religious Ministries," serving as the "principal assistant to the Chief of Chaplains." Prior to 2000, the Chaplain of the Marine Corps position was held by a senior Navy chaplain holding the rank of Navy Captain.

The Chaplain of the United States Marine Corps (CHMC) is a position always filled by the officer serving as Deputy Chief of Chaplains of the United States Navy as a "dual hatted" billet since 2000. The CHMC oversees religious ministry in the Marine Corps which one Commandant of the Marine Corps defined as "a vital function which enhances the personal, family, and community readiness of our Marines, sailors, and their families. Chaplaincy supports the foundational principle of free exercise of religion and helps to enrich the spiritual, moral and ethical fabric of the military." The current CHMC is Rear Admiral (lower half) Margaret G. Kibben. She was sworn in on July 9, 2010 as the first woman to serve as Chaplain of the Marine Corps and Navy Deputy Chief of Chaplains.

Rear Admiral Margaret Grun Kibben, CHC, USN, is the 18th Chaplain of the United States Marine Corps and is the Deputy Chief of Navy Chaplains. A native of Warrington, PA, Rear Admiral Margaret Grun Kibben graduated from Goucher College, Towson, MD in 1982. In 1986 she received her Master of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary, Princeton, NJ and entered active duty. From 1986-1989 she served with Headquarters and Service Battalion, Security Battalion, the Brig, the Marine Corps Air Facility and the Presidents Helicopter Squadron, HMX-1 in Quantico, VA. Her next assignment was the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, MD, from 1989-1991. Following the academy, she reported to USS SAN DIEGO (AFS-6) in Norfolk, VA where she was the Command Chaplain from 1991-1993. Chaplain Kibben served as the Chaplain Corps Historian at the Chaplain Resource Board between 1993-1995, before being sent for a year of

study at the Naval War College, Newport, RI and the Armed Forces Staff College in Norfolk, VA. In 1996, after receiving her Masters Degree in National Security and Strategic Studies from the Naval War College, she began her four-year assignment with Second Force Service Support Group, Camp Lejeune, NC and made deployments to Turkey and Norway. From 2000-2002, she was the Doctrine Writer for Religious Ministry at the Marine Corps Combat Development Command in Quantico, VA.

RDML Kibben spent the next year at the United States Institute of Peace (USIP) as a Senior Fellow, and in 2002 she received her Doctorate of Ministry from Princeton Theological Seminary, Princeton, NJ. From 2003-2006, she was assigned to U.S. Third Fleet serving as the Fleet Chaplain responsible for the training and certification of all Carrier Strike Group and Expeditionary Strike Group Religious Ministry Teams. In 2006, she deployed as an individual augmentee serving as the Command Chaplain, Combined Forces Command Afghanistan. Upon her return, Chaplain Kibben reported to the Office of the Chief of Navy Chaplains, first serving as the Director for Force Structure and Community Management and subsequently as the Executive Assistant to the Chief of Navy Chaplains.

Chaplain Kibbens personal decorations include the Legion of Merit with one gold star, the Bronze Star, the Meritorious Service Medal with two gold stars, and the Navy Commendation Medal with two gold stars.

RDML served as Chaplain of the USMC for four years and was replaced by RDML Brent Scott.



Capt. Brent W. Scott was promoted to the rank of rear admiral by the commandant of the Marine Corps and assumed his duties as 19th chaplain of the Marine Corps/deputy chief of Navy chaplains at Marine Barracks Washington, 25, July 2014..

During his remarks, Gen. James Amos, Commandant of the Marine Corps, welcomed Scott back to the Marine Corps after serving as battalion chaplain with 3rd Marine Air Wing in Yuma, Arizona early in his career. Amos also acknowledged Scotts ministry to Marines as staff chaplain at Naval Station Rota and later as command chaplain on USS Ronald Reagan.

After administering the oath of office, Amos presented Scott with a copy of the U.S. Constitution, signed by the commandant and sergeant major of the Marine Corps, as well as Scotts flag as a newly promoted flag officer. Rear Adm. Margaret G. Kibben, outgoing chaplain of the Marine Corps, shared her enthusiasm for her successor. Kibben also expressed the incredible sense of belonging that comes with being chaplain of the Marine Corps and a part of the Marine Corps family. Scott has more than 22 years of service as a Navy chaplain ministering to those in the Navy and Marine Corps.

Marine Beer Maker Recreates Authentic Tun Tavern Ale



Almost 239 years old, and still hoppy and refreshing.

A Marine beer-brewer in Virginia dove into his history books to research and create "1775," a new ale that replicates the brew the first Marines drank at Tun Tavern. And he's releasing it in time for the Marine Corps birthday bash in November.

Capt. Brian Magee, a judge advocate who works at the Washington Navy Yard, created 1775 as one of his first brews for **Fidelis Beer Company**, a newly licensed enterprise dedicated to making good brews that support good causes. The project was inspired by the company Dogfish Head, which used authentic ingredients and techniques thousands of years old to create its popular line of Ancient Ales.

The first step for Magee was some serious research.

“There are beer historians out there, and there's a lot of public information you can find about hops and the history of different hops varieties, and brewing in colonial America,” he said. “Here are some of the ingredients that were available, and it's up to me to put them in a recipe that tastes good.”

He decided on an ale that used a common hop variety and a strong base malt. The resulting brew is tasty, with a biscuity flavor, he said.

For each of the four beers that Magee is planning to brew, a portion of the proceeds will go to support a different cause or organization, from caring from

wounded warriors to preventing human trafficking. He has already decided that 1775 will help support the Semper Fi Fund, which cares for wounded, ill and injured troops and their families.

His next project is to make 1775 the official beer of the Commandant's Birthday Ball, which will be held Nov. 8 at the Gaylord National Resort and Convention Center in National Harbor, Maryland.

“I've reached out to the birthday ball committee,” he said. “We'd actually like to see it in bottles at the ball.”

Though Magee just received his license to brew and sell beer in Virginia, he aspires to see his company become a nationally distributed brand, competitive with the largest American breweries. So far, the reception to his concept has been warm, particularly among his Marine colleagues.

“They love the idea, they love the purpose behind it,” he said. “That resonates with other Marines because we joined this organization to have an impact, whether on the people we serve or on the world.”
