When the Continental Congress raised up two battalions of Marines in 1775, it launched the greatest fighting force the world has ever known –a force revered globally for its uncommon valor, unparalleled adaptability, and ferocious tenacity. Over the past 240 years, the battlefields and equipment have changed, but the spirit of the United States Marine Corps has prevailed in every clime and place.

One hundred years ago, Marine Corps Recruit Depot Parris Island opened its doors as the first base dedicated solely to making Marines. Since then, hundreds of thousands of men and women have been forged into elite warriors at Parris Island, Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego, and The Basic School in Quantico. We take great pride in our legacy and in the fine men and women who carry our colors into the future. And we extend heartfelt thanks to our families for their stead-fast support.

Our 26th Commandant, General Louis Wilson, once said, "In the last analysis, what the Marine Corps becomes is what we make of it during our respective watches. And that watch of each Marine is not confined to the time he spends on active duty. It lasts as long as he is 'proud to bear the title of United States Marine." Thank you all for guarding the legacy of our Corps during your watch.





Korea...."Tootsie Roll" Drop

arines in North Korea were airdropped crates of Tootsie Rolls.

Over the course of 17 days, Marines fighting at North Korea's Chosin Reservoir during the Korean War put out a call for "Tootsie Rolls," their code for 60mm mortar rounds. When supplies were finally airdropped to

them on the ground, they opened the crates to find... candy. Thousands of actual Tootsie Rolls.

The Marines were surrounded and outnumbered by Chinese and North Korean troops as much as 10-to-1. Temperatures fell as low as 30 to 40 degrees below zero;



Jeep batteries cracked, weapons wouldn't cycle, and foul weather inhibited resupply missions. You might imagine how pissed off the Marines were to find candy where their mortar rounds should have been... and you'd be wrong. Since the bitter cold also froze the Marines' Crations. Tootsie Rolls became an easy source of calories. The small chocolates were also easy to warm up and reform, so the Marines would use them to plug bullet holes in Jeeps, barrels, and other materials. The candies would quickly freeze solid again, and the materiel was ready for

The Tootsie Rolls absolutely reinvigorated the 1st Marine Division. Marines are known for their ability to "make do" and the Tootsie Roll airdrop was no exception. Chairman Mao ordered the complete annihilation of the Marines at Chosin, but like Popeye the Sailor and his spinach, United States Marines fueled by small candies wiped the frozen Siberian tundra with 120,000 Chinese Communists. To this day, when the Chosin Few have reunions, the Tootsie Roll Company sends boxes to them, wherever they are.

Why the Marine Corps Birthday Matters

he time for celebration and pageantry is once again at hand with the 240th Marine Corps birthday set to take place Nov.

What does the celebration mean to Marines across the globe? To Gen. John A. Lejeune, obviously, it meant a great deal. On Nov. 1, 1921, he issued Marine Corps Order No. 47, Series 1921, which provided a summary of the history, mission and traditions of the Corps.

The illustrious Lejeune directed that the order be read to every command each subsequent year on Nov. 10 in honor of the founding of the Marine Corps.

It will certainly be read in locations across the United States, Afghanistan and across the globe wherever Marines might be found. It might be a silent observation in a austere location, or perhaps a more ceremonial reading.

Either way it was formalized in 1952, by Commandant Gen. Lemuel C. Shepherd Jr., who directed the celebration of the Marine Corps Birthday be formalized throughout the Corps. The details were included in the Marine Corps Drill Manual approved in 1956 and helped bring together the inclusion of a cake ceremony and other traditions still held every year at the Marine Corps Birthday Ball. One key piece is the passing of the first piece of cake from senior to junior Marines; it is a symbolic gesture of the passing of experience and knowledge. That tradition begins in recruit training and at Officer Candidates School, where knowing where one comes from, knowing our past and living up to that example set is emblazoned in the minds of those in training.

Do we consider that? Do Marines take the time to think of that example set before us? When Marines see a veteran, do they think to themselves, "how will the Corps carry on after I am gone?"

To some this might seem trivial, it might be an afterthought. Not to the Marines in Afghanistan, or the 589 Quantico Marines who volunteered to perform community service in 2011, or even the Marines who will find themselves supporting the Marine Corps Marathon this weekend-their mark on history shall not be tarnished.

Nothing Marine Corps was an afterthought to Roland Brooks, an Iwo Jima veteran and Texas Marine Corps League representative who was present at a Texas Rangers baseball game in Arlington, Texas, July 3, 2009. Although Brooks had trouble standing for long periods and had difficulty walking due to bad knees, he insisted on standing while poolees took their oath of enlistment in front of the Texas crowd. The temperature on the field was more than 100 degrees, but Brooks said he was going to be a part of the ceremony no matter what the cost. He wanted to be that symbolic representation of the Corps. He wanted to, even if it meant he might die.

To that end we should emulate that example, and take part in history. Enjoy the fruits of your labor and revel in the spectacle and unabashed camaraderie that can be found at the Marine Corps ball.

ell November is here and the 240th Marine Corps Ball is just around the corner! By the time you read this The 2015 Veterans Day Parade will be History.

Thinking about Our more Experienced Marine Members: Frank Mansfield 94 one of MY Oldest Close Friends as well as Joe Zayton 91 who introduced me to the Marine Corps League and also Sandy Mazzu 90, reminded me of a story I read in a book about WW2!

The story was about two Japanese solders who were captured by US Marines on one of the islands during WW2. They were being interrogated by an Army Major who through an interpreter ask them what were they sent out to find. One of the prisoners finally said we were sent out to find the "Yellow Legs".

The Major had no idea what the prisoner was talking about and so he asked what do you mean "Yellow Legs "? The prisoner stated there are two kinds of American Soldiers Green Legs and Yellow Leg. When the Japanese soldiers attack American green legs they shoot and run away. When Japanese soldiers attack American yellow Legs they would charge and then attack the Japaneses forces no matter how large the Japanese force was. So when we located the Yellow Legs position we were to return and inform our superiors so our Japanese Comrades could go around them. We failed when we were capture and taken prisoners by yellow legs. (During the island campaign there were local plants that could badly cut up ones legs and if not treated could badly injure a person. The U.S Marines were issued Yellow Leg gins to prevent this from happening.) When word got out all Marines and some Army units started wearing them all the time.

A side note from a friend who was stationed in Afghanistan. Where Marines are guarding a compound insurgents never attacked! If the Marines had to go out for a mission they would dress Army and Locals in Marine uniforms while they were away.

We are a Force that is Respected throughout the Wold!!!.




12) Good of the League

- f) Jeff Jones indicated that he had tickets for the Department Raffle available. The drawing will be held in January 16th at the Winter Quarterly meeting.


